

I have been asked to put together a piece for each issue of the Parish Echo pertaining to the history of West Row and give insight into the life of our village and her peoples over the past few centuries. This first article is very much an introduction, telling you what I plan to write about and a little bit of background on the village itself for anyone who may not know.

The group is keen to set up a museum for the Parish, but to do so we need your input and help. Ideas for fund raising, where it could be sited, who is prepared to be a volunteer?

not afford to display even a replica of our beloved Roman Treasure) Contact Ellen and help get this long overdue project off to a fantastic start.

I plan on having a different topic be the main focus of each article, things like the agriculture within the village, our flower business, architecture and housing, archaeology found within the village, world wars and even events and trends throughout the ages that the village would have seen and may have been impacted by.

It is unknown what the meaning of West Row's name means exactly and where it derives from but West is obviously the direction in which it lies. Row or Rowe as it has been recorded on maps in the past is a head scratcher. It could come from the Norweagean Rå meaning boundary line (West Boundary line) or the Middle High German Rige meaning Row/Ditch (West Ditch, West Row).

The village of West Row itself dates back to the time of the Bronze Age; evidence being found of a small settlement just outside the modern village. In the Bronze Age the settlement would have been surrounded by marshland, Alder trees growing on the lower ground with Oak trees upon the high ground, very different to today's landscape. Emmer wheat and grains have been found along with other forms of crafting and agriculture showing that this was an established settlement.

Then in the 2nd - 4th century AD, the Romans came to England and West Row, leaving us with two or three Roman villas and many buildings to do with agriculture, animal rearing and famously the West Row treasure. The small settlement of West Row had begun to take shape. But after the fall of the Roman empire the buildings would have fallen into disrepair and a new invader would come to West Row.




The evidence of an Anglo Saxon settlement in the area has been found withing the area of Judes Ferry. Between the fourth and tenth centuries the village slowly begins to fan out into what we know today.


And then we reach the medieval period of 1066-1485. It is the first period in which we still have surviving evidence from in the form of five houses dating from the mid- to the late medieval period which are dotted throughout the modern layout of the village, suggesting that the villages footprint hasn't changed much along its twisting cattle paths since the 16th century.

From then on, the village continued to grow, adapting to modern times and making way for modern means. Many of the medieval, and later 1600-1700s wooden houses made way for flint and brick buildings, the previous succumbing to fires throughout the ages. We lost our abattoir as people stopped raising their own livestock but gained a butchers. We lost Bedlam Yard on the right heading The Green close to the triangle near Beeches Road, but in return we saw better housing and indoor toilets.

Our village continues to grow and adapt. Next issue we will talk about the Romans coming to Britain and the impact it had on West Row.


This is another once-in-a-lifetime occasion and we will celebrate as only West Row knows how.









Times and Seasons

For most of us as each year progresses, we have particular times and dates which are significant to us. As I write this it doesn't seem long since we were celebrating Christmas. Our churches were full as we remembered the birth of Jesus and all that God gave us through His Son. But as you read this article the Christmas season will have passed for another year and the Christian Church will soon be starting to remember the events of Holy Week and Easter as the season of Lent begins. AROUND THE ALLOTMENTS

After the fun and relaxation of the Christmas and New Year's festivities it's a good time to start getting the allotment (or garden) ready for the coming year. Having a good clean and tidy space helps with planting and for keeping the plot clean of weeds in future months.



Pruning of fruit bushes and trees should have been done by the end of February (not in the frost though) and it's an ideal time to chit early potatoes ready to set in March/April for some lovely new potatoes ready to harvest ten to twelve weeks later. If you have a polytunnel or greenhouse it's possible to set some inside a little earlier for a few tasty bites before the outside crop is ready.

Now is also the time that you can set crops into the ground such as broad beans, salad onions, garlic, shallots, onion sets and parsnips. For crops including cabbages, peas, onion seeds and rocket, sowing seeds under cover will give them a good head start ready for planting outside. Before the growing season gets into full swing it is an ideal opportunity to get jobs done such as building or repairing fruit cages and cold frames ready for growing.

Looking a bit later into March (depending on the weather), it's a good time to plant things like beetroot, turnips, swede, carrots and radishes. Also, it's a good idea to keep on top of any young weeds so they don't overpower your crops and become a nuisance. Bird scarers can also be useful on the allotment or garden to help with the ever-hungry bird population.

Tips from Colin:

Hello Folks: Just a few tips for your veg. patch.

BROAD BEANS: Variety - Masterpiece Green, very good for freezing.

Get planting as soon as you can. Lots of vitamin A and C.

CARROTS: Variety – Romance. RADISH: Pink Lady. If you have a greenhouse or polytunnel plant in March onwards and outside from April to July. Sow thinly. Cover with fine soil and newspaper but don't let the leaves touch the covering. Water with a fine spray if conditions are dry.

ONIONs and SHALLOTS: high in vitamins. Plant in March

LEEKS: Variety **Musselburgh**: Sow March/April in prepared seedbed for use in October through April. Sow thinly 1" apart in drills ¼" deep and 6" apart. Cover with fine soil. Thin out as soon as possible to 2" apart and again 4" apart. Can be sown earlier under glass **POTATOES**: Variety **Casablanca**. Set in egg trays with eyes upward in frost-safe place.

Early variety and good disease resistant.

Did you know that West Row had a village magazine which was produced at Christmas 1932, some ninety years ago? it was titled The Westrovian and produced by the Mildenhall West Row Council School.

it is planned to reproduce some of the articles that were printed, in this and future editions of the echo, which it is hoped you will find interesting and at times would be deemed controversial in today's current thinking by some people! The introduction contains the following:


